Midnight's Children Barbican 0845 120 7500, to Feb 23. Sharply realised vignettes, vivid snatches of Indian talk, swirls of colour, an imaginative use of film - there is a great deal to savour in this bold adaptation of Salman. Rushdie's novel about the generation born just as India achieved independence. There are also vigorous and often humorous performances from a 20-strong British Asian cast. But the story has lost some of its momentum in the shift from book to stage, and the production ravishes the eve rather more than it fouches the heart.

Iron Royal Court 020 7565 5000, to March 1. The setting is a Scottish women's prison. Fay is serving life for killing her husband; 15 years into her sentence, her daughter comes to visit her for the first time. Rona Munro's play made a strong impression at last year's Edinburgh Festival, and it looks even better second time round: subtle, involving, notably free from clichés. There is a superlative performance from Sandy McDade as Fay, and fine support from the

rest of the cast. A Passage to India Riverside Studios 020 8237 1111. E.M. Forster's story, pitting the prejudices of the British Raj against what he called the 'muddle and mystery' of India, provides Shared Experience with their latest adaptation of a classic novel. It isn't quite in the same class as their best work. Too much caricature creeps into the presentation of the British characters, while the spiritual aspects of the book are underplayed, but the evening is still an absorbing one, with fine performances and lively evocations of the Indian scene.
